New feature articles

News from the Maths Hubs Programme

Primary

NRICH offer their usual <u>Advent Calendar</u> of activities, one activity per day in the run up to Christmas (an alternative to chocolate!). MEI's latest <u>Primary Newsletter</u> has a fistful of Christmas activity suggestions. On Tes, <u>J.M. Powell suggests</u> six sheets of multi-step problems with irreverent Christmas themes. Or you could try some <u>ten-minute Christmas fillers</u> from Broadbent Maths for those moments between Nativity rehearsals.

Secondary

NRICH also have an <u>Advent Calendar</u> for secondary students: this year each problem involves some sort of interactivity. There's some lovely problem-solving in <u>Is there enough wrapping paper?</u> from OUP. Don Steward has <u>a pair of Christmas quizzes</u>. And Complete Maths has Christmas Catastrophe! and How to make an origami Santa.

BAFTA success for Numberblocks!

We are delighted that the CBeebies television series, *Numberblocks*, has won a BAFTA award! The NCETM's Director for Primary, Debbie Morgan, was Maths Consultant for the series, created by Blue Zoo Animation Studio.

Numberblocks was nominated in the Pre-School Animation category and came out top at the recent awards ceremony, which Debbie attended.

The *Numberblocks* series follow the adventures of characters One to Twenty, encouraging children to explore the properties of number through the features of each character and how they relate to one another. Later series explore bigger numbers, place value and the number system.

We have published <u>support materials for series 1 and 2</u>, so that teachers can use the episodes with their children in Reception and Year 1, with ideas and activities to draw out the mathematical concepts.
